Trial door-to-door minibus service to come to Rushden and Higham Ferrers

We are pleased to announce an extended 'Wellibus' service is to be trialled between Rushden and Higham Ferrers.

Provided by Shire Community Services and jointly funded by Rushden and Higham Ferrers

Town Councils, the new Dial-a-Ride style door-to-door minibus service is wheelchair friendly and fully accessible for those with mobility needs. It is specifically designed for residents who are unable to use public transport due to age or disability and help them access local shops and town centres using the concessionary bus scheme.

The demand-led service allows passengers to book up to 5 days in advance, or up to 12noon on the day before they would like to travel. Regular bookings can also be taken if you attend a weekly day centre, class or social group. Every day is different and dependent on the number of passengers booked.

To use the Wellibus service, a membership fee of £15 is required for the six month trial period, which starts from the end of March 2023. Transport on the bus is then completely FREE of charge if you hold a concessionary bus pass (Disabled or older person's bus pass)

A spokesperson for Rushden Town Council said, "Since Expresslines withdrew its Rushden-Higham Link in September, both town councils have been working together to secure a financially viable replacement service. The announcement of the Wellibus trial is great news for both towns, especially for the residents who relied on the Rushden-Higham Link. This new scheme is a case of **use it or lose it** and we encourage you to **get on board** and sign up to ensure the service continues."

The Wellibus service commences late March, 2023 and you can sign from the 1st March 2023 on your town council website. Forms will also be available from numerous outlets across the two towns. Towards the end of the trial, both councils will review its level of use and how well it is meeting your needs.

Councillor David Jenney



Councillors and staff were deeply saddened by the sudden loss of Councillor David Jenney on 26th December 2022.

Councillor Jenney had been a member of Rushden Town Council since 2007 and had been Chairman of both the Planning Consultative Committee and Policy and Resources Committee during that time. He was also Town Mayor for Rushden in 2013/2014 and performed this role with great enthusiasm and dignity.

David was highly respected within the Town Council and local community of Rushden where he was ward member for the Bates ward and his experience and great depth of knowledge will be greatly missed.

In addition, Councillor Jenney had also served as a valued member of East Northamptonshire Council since 2007, where he was Deputy Leader for several years. Councillor Jenney was an instrumental part of the steering group leading up to the formation of North Northamptonshire Council in April 2021.

At the time of his death David was a serving member of North Northamptonshire Council.

As a mark of respect the Union Flag at Rushden War Memorial has been lowered and our deepest sympathies are with Cllr Jenney's family at this very sad time.

A Brief History Of: Rushden Hall

Taken from the Amenities Society leaflet 1977, sketches by Clive Wood

Though a private Manor, Rushden Hall, as early as the 13C appears to have been associated with officers of Higham Park or Castle and later with John of Gaunt, son of Edward III.

Robert Pemberton 1461, first of the family which occupied the Hall for 200 years, M.P. for Northampton 1477-8, High Sheriff in 1480, Usher of the Chamber to Richard III.

Robert Pemberton 1542-1609, Gentleman Usher to Elizabeth I, his brother Sir Goddard Pemberton M.P. for Lewes and High Sheriff of Hertfordshire, (their fine tombs to be seen in St. Mary's Church).

Sir Lewis Pemberton High Sheriff of Northamptonshire in 1616, died 1639, the last of the family to live at the Hall which became the home of John Ekins of Chester House, Irchester, his grandson, another John, died in 1740.

The Fletcher family first recorded in 1755, John Fletcher sold the Hall for 'the benefit of creditors' in 1836.

Thomas Williams, a man with a considerable fortune came from Berkshire and was in residence in 1822,

High Sheriff in 1829, married twice he fathered some twenty one children and died at Windsor in 1881 aged 85 years.

The last family to occupy the Hall as a home appear in about 1840, when the newly married Frederick Urban and Mary Ann Sartoris took up residence, their grandson, Arthur Hugh Sartoris inherited the Estate, selling the property in 1929.

Rushden Urban District Council purchase the hall in 1931 from Mr Wheeler.

The Hall architecturally, is a complex mixture of styles both internally and externally - the early 16C arches within the Front Hall survive from the Great Hall of the Tudor house. The fine east front with its 'Dutch' gables and semi-circular bay windows, being post-Jacobean were probably built by Sir Lewis Pernberton, about 1630. Thomas Williams between 1820-30 carried out many alterations, adding the centre bay to the east front and re-modelling the south front, erecting the embattled porch (from elsewhere) and dividing the Great Hall into other rooms, incorporating the arms of Williams, Berthon and Cunningham into the ceiling of the Front Hall, the old





Lodge and gates were of this period. F U Sartoris added the two gabled projections to the north-west incorporating a new kitchen and servants quarters, a second bay on the south front and the stable block.

and 'Flemish' over mantle were brought from Bristol, the fire-back beneath depicts the arms of Edward VI and came from Higham Castle.

The wall surrounding the old kitchen garden is worthy of note being built without mortar, according to Cole 'the engagement entered into with the builder, was, that it should be erected without lime or soft mixture of any kind, and that, if even a bee could creep in between the interstices, the contract should be void'.

Internally the two staircases possess original 17C balustrades though reconstructed, the linenfold panelling.

It is with pride I have travelled the area, to numerous events, representing Rushden and meeting so many interesting people, whilst letting them know all about the Rushden community.


In our town, we have a wealth of individuals and groups that do so much for Rushden, and it has been an honour to be associated with them.

Weddings at Rushden Hall

Rushden Hall dates back to the 14th century and is an interesting mix of styles, resulting in an attractive house of mellow limestone. The Hall is surrounded by 34 acres of beautiful parkland, making a superb backdrop for wedding photographs. There are two rooms available for wedding ceremonies, the Fletcher Room and the Panelled Room.

The Fletcher Room accommodates 50 seated guests, or a reception of 40 guests seated at tables. The Panelled Room is a smaller, more romantic ceremony room, accommodating 35 seated guests.

Larger wedding receptions can be accommodated in the Walled Garden, adjacent to the hall, a perfect setting for the marquee.

Rushden Town Council has planted several trees across the town as a part of The Queen's Green Canopy initiative, in memory of her late Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II.

The Queen's Green Canopy (QGC) is a tree planting initiative created to mark Her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee in 2022 which invites everyone across the UK to plant trees. Following the death of Her Majesty The Queen, and the wishes of His Majesty The King, the initiative will be extended to the end of March 2023 to give people the opportunity to plant trees in memoriam to honour The Queen.

IMPROVED TENNIS COURT BOOKING SYSTEM AT SPENCER PARK

The tennis courts at Spencer Park, Rushden will soon be operating a new booking and access system starting in the Spring of 2023.

This is an exciting development with a much improved and modern approach to how our community tennis courts can be booked. It will help provide fair and equal access to everyone who want to use the courts to play tennis, which we know become very popular from April onwards.

Once the gates are installed, they will link to a new online booking system which will enable residents to book a timeslot in advance and then access the tennis courts using a unique pin code sent via email. To ensure the tennis courts remain in a clean and playable condition into the future the council will also be introducing a low cost booking fee to access the courts during certain periods of the year. There will still be plenty of free court hours available throughout the week to book.

To further support people playing tennis in Rushden, the town council will also be working with an LTA qualified and accredited tennis coach. Starting from mid-April, a weekly free tennis coaching sessions will run on Sundays. This will follow on from the Park Run that starts at 9am. The free tennis session will be open to families and players of all ability, to help you improve and enjoy your tennis.
