
DON'T RUBBISH RUSHDEN!




For Rushden Town Councillor:

A Brief History Of: Rushden





Memorial

In 1921, Sir Arthur de Capell Brooke unveiled a striking memorial in honour of the 380 sons of Rushden who sacrificed their lives in the Great War. The memorial stands tall, octagonal in shape, with three tiers and a tapering spire, embodying a modern interpretation of the Classic Renaissance style.

At the unveiling ceremony, attended by approximately 12,000 individuals, a profound sense of solemnity and reverence prevailed. Sir Arthur, before revealing the memorial beneath the Union Jack, expressed gratitude for the unified effort of Rushden in creating a tribute to those who perished in service to King and Country.

Symbolising key virtues, the memorial features figures representing Fortitude, Sympathy, and St. George, the patron saint of England, each fittingly integrated into its design.



Fortitude symbolises the resilience that sustained our forces during the darkest times, while Sympathy represents the unity that bound our nation together, ultimately leading to victory under the patronage of St. George.

The dedication ceremony was led by the Rector, with Mr. Fred Knight, Chairman of the Rushden War Memorial Committee, formally handing over custody of the memorial to the Rushden Urban Council, accepted by Mr. W. Bazeley, Chairman of the local Council.

Following the formalities, a touching tribute occurred as a multitude of beautiful wreaths were laid at the base of the memorial, a testament to the enduring memory of those it commemorates.

Designed by Messrs. Gotch & Saunders of Kettering, with intricate carving executed by Messrs. Reynolds & Son of Northampton, the memorial stands as a lasting tribute to the courage and sacrifice of Rushden's fallen heroes.

A profoundly moving occasion which saw two-thirds of Rushden's population gather to witness the unveiling and to be part of this momentous moment in time.

Favourite sport?




Favourite pastime/hobby?

Looking after grandchildren – Sebastian (4) and Ophelia (1¾). Otherwise – Gardening, walking, reading (historical fiction), testing real ale!.





The Mallards Fishing and Wildlife Ponds

The Mallards fishing ponds, off Centaine road are available for public fishing, Historically this area was an old sand a gravel pit and is now a balancing pond for the surface water generated from the surrounding roads.

Fishing is permitted from the designated platforms at the ponds providing you have a valid rod license. If you are aged 13 or over, you must have a rod fishing licence when fishing anywhere in England for salmon, trout, freshwater fish, smelt and eels. This applies to all waters including commercial, privately owned or club fisheries.

Fishing without a rod fishing licence is illegal and you can be fined up to £2,500. Licences for children aged between 13 and 16 are free but you still need to get one from www.GOV.UK/fishing-licences or by calling 0344 800 5386.

The pond has a number of Volunteer Bailiffs who are at the ponds checking on anglers to ensure all users are fishing within the rules of the ponds and have a valid rod license. The Council is hoping to participate in the Building Bridges project with the Angling Trust. Further information is available from www.anglingtrust.net/building-bridgesproject/

Rushden Town Council have given grant funding to the Fishing for Minds CIC project that is aimed at getting people into fishing to improve for mental wellbeing. The site is also enjoyed by dog walkers and local residents who visit the site.
