Letters To Heaven

A 'Letters to Heaven' Post Box which allows children and families to send letters to lost loved ones has been installed in Rushden by Rushden Town Council.

Located within our Newton Road Cemetery, it will enable people to write letters, cards and messages to those they have lost and post them.



Every letter or card put into the memorial post box is treated with respect and confidentiality. They are stored securely and never opened or read.

The received letters and cards will be mulched before being composted then mixed with Rushden Town Council's Coronation wildflower seeds to form a blend that will contribute to the creation of a wildflower meadow.

A Brief History Of:

A Brief History Of: A PROMINENT LOCAL FAMILY WITH A FASCINATING STORY TO TELL... The Willy Family

PW Wills Department Store

In 1922, Percy and Helen Wills began their business venture by opening a small shop on Park Road in Rushden. Initially, their shop focused on women's fashion.













Percy soon discovered that his wife had a keen sense of judgement, taste, and a strong interest in fashion. During their early years at Park Road, the couple began the P.W. Fashion Show, which quickly become popular. Despite clothing being rationed, the 1948 show held at Windmill Hall attracted a staggering two thousand people.

On 6th February 1954, Actress Jane Griffiths, who was filming at Pinewood Studios, arrived to commemorate the 21st anniversary of the shop's opening and presented gifts. Her first leading role in a film, which also starred Gregory Peck, was being screened at the Kettering cinema - 'The Millionaire Pound Note'.



The business was successful and moved to larger premises on the corner of Newton Road and the High Street in Rushden. The fashion side of the business grew very quickly and soon lingerie and hats were added to the shoes, coats, dresses and gloves. In 1936 the Wellingborough shop was opened, followed in 1938 by one in Kettering.

The financial crisis of the late 2000s resulted in the business shutting down in September 2010.



Skew Bridge Ski Club

The Ski Club was established in 1952 by John Wills, the son of Percy and Helen Wills. It originated after sand and gravel were extracted from the land to create a lake, which now sits where Rushden Lakes shopping centre stands. The gravel from this lake was also utilised in constructing the Post Office Tower in London.



Initially, the club focused on water skiing and would host events to include The National Water Skiing Championship and The Mid-Anglian Boat Show. In 1965, John Wills built a 200 ft. dry ski slope at a cost of approximately £12,000. The slope allowed skiers to practice before embarking on their ski holidays.



People were invited to this new venture and the Skew Bridge Ski Club was formed named after the awkward road bridge crossing the main road near the Club

History of Jubilee Park



Jubilee Park was opened in 1926 as part of the 50 year Jubilee celebrations for Rushden Industrial Co-operative Society


The park opening was pre-empted by the Annual Co-operative Children's Tea with over 1200 children attending, in order to accommodate all these youngsters, the Co-operative Hall, the Alfred-street Council School, and the High-street Independent Wesleyan Schoolrooms had to be used.

When full justice had been done to the excellent tea, a procession was formed and, headed by the Temperance Band, and marched to the new park in Bedford Road, which the society later presented to the town. Jubilee Park, Rushden, was officially opened on 17th November 1926. Jubilee Park was purchased by Rushden Urban District Council and remained in their ownership until 1974 when East Northamptonshire Council was formed and took over Rushden Urban District Council's assets.

During the Second World War Eight acres of land in Jubilee Park was ploughed up in order to increase food production in

the county. However, the swings and other amusements in the park were spared. The ploughing had been done at the request of the County War Agricultural Committee and by the following year the land was producing potatoes.

Further land belonging to the Urban District Council was also ploughed up, including a plot in the Hall Grounds, the cemetery field and land surrounding housing estates, as part of the war effort. Another change of ownership took place in 2000, when after a referendum, Rushden formed its own Town Council. As a result of this, a number of assets were devolved from East Northamptonshire Council to the Town Council and Jubilee Park was amongst these.




The sports pavilion was also rebuilt in 2015 and a plaque was added in memory of Jim Osborne, who helped form Rushden Sports Ltd to ensure the protection of the football and cricket grounds in Hayden Road. Jim also ran Osbornes Toys and Sports, which continue today supplying sports equipment and a huge range of traditional toys, Jubilee Park now hosts skateboarding events, football, and rugby and continues to offer play and recreational facilities for the people of Rushden.



Two excellent contemporary murals have been undertaken by artist Mark Pacan on the pavilion, to depict the vibrancy and versatility of Jubilee Park as it approaches it's hundredth year.







Exciting New Play Equipment for the Spring!


New play equipment is scheduled to be installed in Hall Park, Spencer Park, and Melloway Park.
